Enthusiasm Marks Inauguration of New Feature of Great Financial Campaign.

Industrial plants in New York city and in other parts of the Second federal reserve district are taking up the service clubs, authorized by the govrnment loan organization, with considerable interest and enthusiasm.

These clubs, which constitute a new feature in loan campaigns, are being formed only in the factories and workshops in which the employes are conducting their own victory liberty loan drives under the supervision of

committees of their own choice.

Membership in these clubs is open to workers who subscribe to \$100 or more of the victory notes. There are two kinds of clubs, one called the \$100 service club and the other the \$200 service club, the first open to those who buy \$100 in notes, and the second to those who subscribe for at ast \$200 worth of the new securi-

charge of the campaign within walls of the factory or shop passes upon applicants for membership and wards buttons to those who qualify. These buttons bears the words:

"Industrial Division, Victory Liberty Loan, \$100 (or \$200) Service Club," and also the figure of an eagle with wings outspread.

The demand for these buttons is coming from all parts of New York state, northern New Jersey and Fairfield county, Connecticut, and is giving evidence of the popularity of the new feeature. Many plants in New York city are forming service clubs, with the co-operation of the advisory trades committee. Following are some of the larger towns in which the movement to form service clubs is gaining headway well in advance of the campaign:

Niagara Falls, Rochester, West Orange, Poughkeepsie, Ballston Spa, Potsdam, Watervilet and Glens Falls, in New York state; Ozone Park, College Point and Port Jefferson, L. I. N. Y.; and Dover, Franklin Furnace Irvington, Lambertville, Phillipsburg, Ridgefield Park and Pompton Lakes, in New Jersey, as well as South Norwalk in Connecticut.

The prompt organization of service clubs and the installation of the industrial plant system of canvassing show that workingmen in every par of the Second federal reserve district are alive to the situation and are going to do their full share in the victory liberty loan.
